International science teachers to visit **Greenfield Community** Science Workshop

Group from Timor-Leste hopes to learn best ways to develop science centers in their country

GREENFIELD - A group of top science teachers from the Southeast Asian nation of Timor-Leste will be visiting the Greenfield Community Science Workshop next Tuesday and

Wednesday, May 28 and 29.

The group hails from Timor-Leste's National Commission for UNESCO, and will be touring various science centers, large and small, throughout California to build a vision on how best to develop the small science centers they are supporting in the districts of their country.

On Tuesday, May 28, the team will also be making a pre sentation to the Greenfield City Council regarding their work in Timor-Leste and their ideas for collaboration with the Green-field Community Science Workshop.

The group of six teachers comprise a division of the Timor-Leste National Commission for UNESCO called SESIM, an acronym in the local language of Tetun meaning the Center for the Study of Science and Mathematics. Each is a classroom teacher with more than a decade of experience in curriculum development and teacher training at the national

level.

When Timor-Leste achieved independence in 2003 after 400 years of colonial rule, qualified teachers were hard to come by, as was relevant local curriculum. SESIM/UNESCO teachers began in 2009 to work with the Timor-Leste Ministry of Education to develop curricula and teacher resources that take advantage of local culture and knowledge as it relates to the international canon of science and mathematics.

These resources are now in use throughout Timor-Leste at all levels, kindergarten through university. SESIM has also set up five small science centers patterned after the Community Science Workshop model, which originated at the Mission Science Workshop in 1991.

Since 2009, SESIM has been assisted by U.S. science teach-er/trainer Curt Gabrielson, current employee of the Greenfield Community Science Workshop and founding director of the Watsonville Environmental Science Workshop. Gabrielson helped the SESIM teachers uncover and develop local activities to be used in the classroom.

Gabrielson has just returned from living in Timor-Leste for six years and will be touring together with the SESIM/UNES-

GONZALES - Gonzales High School alumna Fabiola Moreno-Ruelas wants to give back to her hometow community by creating a scholarship for graduating seniors.

Moreno-Ruelas, who graduated from Gonzales last year, is currently wrapping up her first year at San Diego State Univer sity. She was aided in developing the Ru-elas Fulfillment Scholarship by community member Maury Treleven, who provided guidance and helped set up the fund.

The scholarship requires a cumulative GPA of 2.9 and 80 hours of community service. Four students from the 2018-19 graduating class will be chosen to receive a \$500 scholarship.

City of Gonzales chooses Gloria Road as next project

GONZALES — Gloria Road will be the next road rehabilitation project for the City of Gonzales, with aid from Monterey County and Senate Bill 1, and will be the main focus for the 2019-20 fiscal year.

Over the past two years, funds from Senate Bill 1 (SB) have gone toward the rehabilitation of Alta Street and will change in the upcoming year to another roadway in need of repair. According to Public Works Director Patrick Dobbins, the City will receive about \$142,000 from SB1 for the next fiscal year.

The City has 1,400 feet of Gloria Road and then it transitions to County jurisdiction," Dobbins said. "We're

partnering with the County to deliver this

Gloria Road is one of four areas the City has been looking at, along with Iver-son Road and Iverson to Johnson Canyon Road. The project was paused when the November ballot featured Proposition 6 to repeal the gas tax.

The project is under city leadership currently because Monterey County does

not have senior project managers.
"This will be a full reconstruction,"
Dobbins added. "We drafted an MOU (Memorandum of Understanding) and held a project scope meeting with County staff last week where we talked about different moving parts."

The project is estimated to cost \$10

million. Dobbins said the City's portion

will be \$450,000 to \$500,000. The Coun ty will be responsible for Dobbins' time on the project, and because the projects are planning to be together, the economies of scale provides a better rate.

"We're considering the same type of reconstruction method that we have on Alta," Dobbins said. "Where we ground up the road, the base materials, put it back down, add cement and put new asphalt on top of that."

Through using this method, Dobbins and the City are anticipating a stronger and sturdier road than the current state The project is anticipated to go out for bidding in January or February of 2020.

Efforts are also underway to develop the building at 110 N. Vanderhurst Ave. into a local Visitor and History Center, which will face the Downtown Plaza.

One of the key goals of the City of King's economic development efforts is to improve the downtown. If the City can attract more people to its downtown, it will help gen-

erate new businesses and jobs throughout the community. Therefore, a Streetscape Plan was developed in 2017. One of the recommendations of the Plan was for a Downtown Plaza to provide a focal point for people to relax, enjoy, gather

and participate in activities in the heart of the downtown.

The City has acquired the property and the buildings and has hired RRM Design Group to prepare the conceptual de sign. Construction is anticipated in 2020 to 2021.
